The Boy Scout councils of Eastern Massachusetts will be sponsoring another University of Scouting on Saturday, November 6, 2010, at Greater Lawrence Technical School, at 57 River Road in Andover, just off of Exit 45 from Interstate 93. We are planning another midway to expand your horizons of opportunity for all of the Scouting programs. We want to make the Eastern Massachusetts Scouting University an important part of your Scouting program by bringing you new resources and new ideas. This is a fabulous opportunity to make your Scouting program better for your Scouts and easier for you.

We are planning to put on over 150 presentations so there will be something for everyone. Some of these courses are programs which are hard to find anywhere else. Although, we have broken the courses down into separate colleges as a guide for you, please take any course that you want. Remember that for Cub Scout leaders, attending either a University of Scouting or Pow-Wow is required for your adult leader recognition. We are also going to run programs for Junior Leaders.

The cost of the program is \$20 if your registration is received at the council service-center on or before October 16, 2010. Late registration is \$25. We will not be able to process late registrations received after November 3, 2010, but will accept walk-in registrations at the door. Walk in registrants may miss the first period class.

We ask that you please pre-register for the courses that you want. The course numbers contain three parts. The letter indicates which type of course, the first number is the period, and the last two numbers are the classroom. Classroom 00 is the outdoor cooking area or the baseball field. The fourth period courses will be staggered to create two overlapping lunch periods for your convenience; however you may only take one fourth period course. We reserve the right to change, substitute, or cancel classes and exhibitors as necessary.






Please wear your Scout uniform. Parking is at the rear of the school. The doors will open for check-in and coffee at 8 o'clock. Our opening ceremony will start at 8:45, with the first period starting at 9 o'clock.

Your course registration fee includes a cold cut buffet for lunch. Announcements will be made to direct Scouters to Lunch. If you encounter a long line, please take a few minutes to look around the Midway area, we don't want to waste your time. The registration staff will be available to help you with any questions or concerns. The Midway will be open in the cafeteria from 11am until 2:30 PM. We also hope to raffle off door prizes in the Cafeteria at 1 o'clock.
