

**David L. Cargill, Jr.**  
**United States Marshal - District of New Hampshire**



On July 31, 2009 President Barack Obama nominated David L. Cargill Jr. for the position of United States Marshal in the District of New Hampshire. Marshal Cargill was confirmed by the United States Senate on October 14<sup>th</sup>, 2009 with a vote of unanimous consent.

The United States Marshals Service is the nation's oldest federal law enforcement agency in the country. President George Washington appointed the first 13 U.S. Marshals, including the first Marshal for the District of New Hampshire, John Parker in 1789. The Marshals Service now has 94 U.S. Marshals supported by over 4,000 deputy marshals and career employees performing the day to day mission of the Marshals Service. Marshal David L. Cargill Jr. is the 36<sup>th</sup> United States Marshal for the District of New Hampshire.

Prior to becoming the U.S. Marshal, Marshal Cargill was member of the New Hampshire State Police for twenty-four years. During his career with the New Hampshire State Police, Marshal Cargill was assigned to the Troop A barracks in Epping, NH where he patrolled the New Hampshire Seacoast and Interstate 95. After spending several years in this capacity he was transferred to State Police Headquarters and assigned to the Special Investigations Unit. In the Special Investigations Unit his primary responsibility was to investigate Organized Crime. While a member of the Special Investigations Unit he was promoted to the supervisory rank of Corporal in 1995 and then Sergeant in 2000. Shortly after September 11<sup>th</sup> Marshal Cargill was placed in charged of the State Police Terrorism Unit. In this capacity, he works closely with the Federal Bureau of Investigation, the Department of Homeland Security, the Immigrations and Naturalization Service and numerous county sheriffs and local police departments. In 2002, he was recognized by the United States Attorney's office in the District of New Hampshire for his efforts in organizing training for law enforcement officers on terrorism issues. Also in 2002 he received official State Police recognition for outstanding performance in two major criminal investigations into illegal gambling and organized crime.

In 2003, Marshal Cargill was assigned as Commander of the Executive Security Unit, Office of the Governor, where he was responsible for the security of the New Hampshire Governor and 1<sup>st</sup> family.

In 2005, Marshal Cargill was assigned as Commander and Administrator of the NH Law Enforcement Information Network Exchange (LINX) program. LINX is a multi agency law enforcement intelligence system.

In 2006, Marshal Cargill was promoted to the rank of Lieutenant and assigned as Commander of both the NH State Police Intelligence and Terrorism Units until his appointment as the United States Marshal for the District of New Hampshire.
